3. Are you a bit of a ham?

Do you like to talk up in class and get into it?

4. Are you an organized, detail-oriented person?

Lawyers need to read the fine print. Berkeley embeds secret things in their applications. You have to read the instructions!

5. Do you read the Voter's Pamphlet?
